

# Citizenship/Kinship: |ntroduction

DETAILS SECTION

Citizenship Return to the right to determine own peoples.

## OUR WORLDVIEW

#### Prior to entering into Treaty

- Many knowledge keepers/holders stated that we discussed with Creator on where we were going and given instructions.
- When a child was born, they were recognized as a person of their Nation.
- Based on the Nations cultural or ceremonial protocols, the child may or may not have been given a pre-determined path. For example, trained to be a Chief, cultural/society leader, etc.
- Nations had their own Natural laws to determine who their people were based on their culture, language, ceremonies, traditions, and societies.
- Nations had laws on birth, adoption, marriage (within and outside of their Nation) and punishments like banishment.






























- Treaty Paylists showed the families, societies, clan systems of each Nation, every year with a \$5 pay out (Gift).
  - Data on births, deaths, marriages, transfers, and banishment were recorded.
- Surveyors noted the Nation population at the time of the establishment of the size of the reserve.

## JUGGESTIONS FOR NEXT STEPS

Suggestion: Work with your Nation and determine the following:

- Meet with your people to determine the basic principles, guidelines, customs and traditions as passed through oral history that make your Nation.
- Determine the requirements for people to be your people.
  - Societies, heads of families, clans, etc., who and what are they?
  - What role will your customs, traditions, and other oral stories play in your citizenship?
  - What role did the historical punishments play in the removal of people?
  - What will your process be to:
    - i. Accept - Birth, inter-Nation marriages, adoption, etc.
    - Deny Does it reflect your understanding as a collective? ii.
    - iii. Remove – What are the grounds (legal/traditional) for removal?
    - iv. Appeal Will applicant be allowed to appeal? What will the process be?
    - ٧. Dispute mechanisms – Connected with appeal process.
    - Banish Connected with denial process?
    - vii. Amendments How? When? By whom? What will the process be?
  - Re-establishment of Treaty Cards or Tribal Enhancement Cards?

SECTION	DETAILS
Nationhood	First Nations Peoples derive their authority from the Creator God and their Citizens of their respective Nations/ Tribes. Since time immemorial our Peoples lived our Inherent way of life. It was about our peoples, our laws, our responsibility to uphold Natural law as promised to Creator.

## OUR WORLDVIEW -

Creator made law is the source of Human made laws – these are the basis and body of Indigenous laws.

- Our relationship with all forms of life is protected by our Natural law.
- Our worldview, values, and principles stem from the original instructions.
- Our laws reflect our understanding of our relationship and responsibilities we have with all our relatives (all forms of life). We have our own languages, words on how we interpret them and how we express ourselves as a collective.
- ▶ We ask permission from the animals, plants, minerals, rocks, waters, and spirits before we use places, harvest food and medicines, dig in the earth, hunt or fish for food for ceremonial purposes.
- We have a wholistic perspective on land use. For people to reconnect, everything comes back to the land.
- Nation to Nation Treaties forged and practiced for over 400 years symbolizes our Nations harmony and collective responsibility and our relationship with the lands, natural resources, (above and below) and territories to guide us based on values of respect and ceremony.
- ► The right to self-determination is about our right to govern our pathways with our peoples and to provide a continued way of life and responsibility to the future generations.
- Free Prior Informed Consent (FPIC) and meaningful consultations are the principles linked to the right to self-determination affirmed by Creator and our way of life.

## **ERC PILOT PROGRAM: BUILDING SKILLS, OPENING** DOORS FOR TSUUT'INA WORKERS

#### Short-term placements. Real-world experience. Pathways to long-term careers

The Employment Resource Centre (ERC) pilot program is underway—linking Tsuut'ina Nation members with handson placements across active Taza projects. Initiated and led by Randy Dodginghorse and Herb Crowchild in collaboration with the Nation, the ERC pilot offers three-day-per-week rotations over the next month, giving participants exposure to multiple trades and the confidence that comes from learning on site. These short-term experiences are designed to build skills, expand networks, and, for many, open doors to full-time employment with our construction partners.

Early placements span underground utilities, HVAC, and fitout work at Taza Park West and Taza Park. Participants rotate through teams to shadow, assist, and learn the full project lifecycle—in the field and at the office—so they can discover where their strengths align.

#### Site Highlights





Taza Park West – Walmart Site – Underground Work with Whissel

Mathias Starlight-Onespot is rotating through underground crews, observing methods, safety, and sequencing to understand what it takes below grade before vertical construction begins.

Canada's First Gay Liberation Protest and March took place on August 28th, 1971 in front of Parliament Hill in the pouring rain with roughly 100 people from all over Ontario and Quebec. On the opposite end of the country, in Vancouver, another small group of twenty(20) gay rights activists gathered to march in front of Robson Square.

In 1973 a Canadian national Pride Week was held in August in several Canadian cities, including Vancouver, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, Saskatoon and Winnipeg. This week solidified the shift towards the gay liberation movement, allowing for the emergence of the concept of gay pride.

Also in 1973, the Diagnostics and Statistics Manual of Mental Disorders removed homosexuality as a "disorder". The first Pride parade in Canada was held in Vancouver in 1978.\*
