Tsuut'ina Nation's Chief Big Belly Middle School receives a \$20,000 Community Board grant from the TELUS Friendly Future Foundation® to build a sensory room.

Tsuut'ina Nation, July 14, 2025 - TELUS Friendly Future Foundation® has donated \$20,000 for the installation of a sensory room at Tsuut'ina Nation's Chief Big Belly Middle School.

This donation will provide space for Chief Big Belly Middle School (CBBMS) students to use when they need access to sensory regulation activities. CBBMS has a student population of 200 and currently does not have a dedicated area where students who experience sensory overload can come to calm and organize their responses. The new sensory room will allow students to reduce their sensory overload and return their focus to learning, positively impacting their ability to excel academically.

The \$20,000 donation from TELUS Friendly Future Foundation® is a significant step forward to Tsuut'ina Education's long-term goal to have a sensory room in each school. In 2023-2024, a sensory room was installed in Chiila Elementary School, and with the creation of the CBBMS sensory room, students transitioning from elementary will have uninterrupted sensory room access as they enter grades 4-8. With continued access, students will develop a higher degree of self-regulation by high school, thanks to the ongoing sensory space and support that help calm and refocus.

"The Tsuut'ina Education Department would like to extend a big sīyísgáàs (thank you) for the support from the TELUS Friendly Future Foundation", said Jonathan Kaiswatum, Director of Education - Tsuut'ina Education Department. "The demand for sensory rooms and classroom sensory tools in our schools will continue to grow in the foreseeable future. With the introduction of inclusive learning programs, dedicated staff, and designated spaces at each school, our department is becoming better equipped to meet the diverse needs of students."

The CBBMS sensory room installation will be completed in October 2025 and will offer immediate support to Tsuut'ina Nation students and staff.







Department Spotlight: Permit & Residency

Parents: Theodore Ouellette (Duck Lake, SK), Dorothy Runner [Ouellette] (Tsuut'ina Nation, AB)

What are your hobbies and interests?

I have many; I have played in a pool league since 1989. I've won several different events across Western Canada, placing 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in those events. I've also had 1st place finishes in the Canadian Western Championships for Scotch Doubles. I was on the Masters teams with igohli, and we placed in a lot of events. I was asked to put together our Tsúūt'ínà ladies' team. We were a team was a tough team to beat. David Meguinis and I were strong in Scotch Doubles, and we had two 1st place wins. We have so many strong players out here, I wish I could name them all. I became a Master in the BCA World Championships in Vegas,

where there were over 900+ women. In those days, there were just a couple of big tournaments in Vegas; now there are many.

I was a single mother, and this hobby allowed me to travel without cost. I won multiple events that got me to Toronto's Canadian Championships, the Vegas BCA, and the ACS Championships. When I became a Master, I won that trip, which didn't provide rooms for the singles event, only for the team events. I kept pretending to practice, and in between, I would rest on the chairs by the tables. I had no money to eat; the \$50 I had was enough to change into coins for the tables. I did not eat for days, then Ted Harms, who was the President of Canadian Cue Sport, had a complaint about someone sleeping in the pool room. He came down and asked me why I didn't tell him. I was just too proud, I guess, he fed me and offered me a room in his suite with him and his wife. Ted was my boss for 4 years. I learned a lot from him about running big tournaments and the strategy of the game. Now at the age of 67, I compete for the enjoyment of the game.

I played in a dart league in Calgary. We had four women on the team, we were the first team from the Nation to enter, and we played singles. We were new to the game, and we learned from my brothers and cousins from Tsúūt'ínà. We would play them for who's going to do the dishes or who will make supper. They kept winning until we realized we were playing with cheap plastic darts, and

they had pro darts, so we secretly got our own darts and started practicing. We finally gave them a challenge, and suddenly we were no longer the ones always doing the chores. At the beginning, you could tell some didn't like us, but after they played against us, we would be joking around, and we made many friends. We won the City Championship four years in a row, and we also won the Most Amiable Team Award three years in a row. I have kept score for the World's Dart Championships in Calgary, that is where I met many pros, like Jackie Wilson and many others.

In my youth, I was in gymnastics, baseball, volleyball, basketball, hockey, and track and field. I was a real competitor back then, but we all always supported each other in the city. On the Nation, I was in Brownies, and I danced in Powwows. I really admired my Auntie Audrie Pipestem; she was my mentor. I would practice at my Granny and Grandpa's house, where my Grandpa George would be making new songs, and my Granny would dress me up. At the Stampede, I took her role in the parade with Grandpa George and wore her regalia. In the morning, I was a real Indian on parade, and after that, I played the Clarinet in the Round-Up band at the Stampede. I was dressed in a commercial headdress (it was red, white and blue) with white heeled cowboy boots, and a mini white buckskin (not real) skirt, marching with a stop sign. It was too funny; I lived in both worlds with many diverse people. I also took tap lessons so that I could learn to do the jig. I could go on and on, my life was very fruitful, my parents entered us in many sports.

When and what was your first job?

My first job was not a paying job, but it led me to be independent at a young age. My parents taught us not to be lazy; we were taught to hustle on our own and not ask for anything. So, my first attempt at working was because I wanted to play hockey so badly. My baseball team was asked if we wanted to start a girls' hockey team in 1972, and we were so excited, but I needed registration to play. I asked my dad, and he did not want to pay for a girl to play hockey. He was already paying for my brothers to play and was volunteering at the rink. I didn't want to tell my igohli friends that my dad wouldn't pay for it, so I went to the Chinese restaurant across the street from Fairview school, where I attended. I walked in and asked the old Chinese man if they needed help. He asked me how old I was, so I told him I was 12. He said I was not old enough, and of course, the tears rolled down my face as I started walking out. He called me back and asked why I'm looking for a job. I told him I wanted to play hockey, and he just looked at me and smiled; I will always remember that gentle smile. He said, "I will pay for your registration, but you have to come after school and peel potatoes in the back, and you need permission from your parents, so they know where you're at." I was scared to tell my parents, and they were upset to learn that I was out looking for money for my registration from a stranger. I said to my dad, "Dad, you always told me to hustle for what I want." He replied, "Well, what are you doing?" I told

him he was letting me wait tables, which was my first lie ever to my parents.

So, I peeled potatoes in the back, sitting on an old cart. I became the best potato peeler ever. I was so happy with myself, then mom and dad said we're coming for dinner, I gulped, thinking 'Oh no.' I went to work after school, and this old man got to know me so well, he asked, "What's wrong? You're not smiling today, you okay?" I told him my parents are coming, and he said, "Don't ever be ashamed of what you do in life if you do it for a good reason. Never lie to your parents." So, I was sitting in the back peeling potatoes, trying to figure out what I'm going to tell them after the lie. My mom and dad came in, the old man seated them, and he came back to me with a clean apron and a notepad and said, "Go take your parents' order." I had the biggest smile on my face, but I was nervous. The funny thing is, he already talked to my dad and told him I was peeling potatoes. He said, "She's a good girl, so pretend you don't know." Then my dad watched us girls play hockey and saw that we were really good skaters and could play the game. After that, he started paying for my registration for the remaining years and continued to volunteer on the Zamboni.

What do you like about working for Tsúūt'ínà Nation?

I came from working in the city, I have to say, when I started working on the Nation, it was so different. I like learning the language and my culture, hearing the language being spoken and taking the Gunaha classes provided in the workforce. I do like casual wear, it's not like in the city, where we must be dressed up all the time, but I still dress respectfully when going to important events, I find it more humbling. Working amongst family members and teasing with each other, because we know our backgrounds, laughter is healthy.

Why is it important to work for your Nation?

To be able to have the opportunity to be amongst family and get to know them more is important. I had been in the city for 56 years before coming out and working with the Nation. A lot of Nation members don't remember me when I was young, and now I'm 67, I was always out visiting with my late grandparents, George and Rosie Runner, teaching me about my culture, learning how to stook in the hayfields and things. I've always been on the outside looking in, so being out here and being proud of my hard-working family members, I'm reminded to represent the hard work instilled in me for our Nation, so I hope to follow suit.

What is a long-term goal for yourself?

My goal is to reach out to all of our Nation's Citizens/Members to help them obtain a permit. This will help limit trespassing, some ask, "Why?" Because so many trespassers are entering our Nation so easily, and I believe if we all do our part and get the permits for our homes and vehicles, it will increase the safety of our Nation. There has been too much happening in our own backyard, so let's do our part and help by getting your permits in your vehicle. That's my goal, to make Tsúūt'ínà a safer place.

Tips for getting through your workday?

I smudge to start my day and pray for our people, and I do say prayers for all; life is too short. I feel better when I make sure I put in my time at work, and having a good work ethic makes me feel like I have accomplished something. I'm very lucky to work with such an awesome team; it makes a difference when you're able to work well with your co-workers. In my new position here on the Nation, I feel welcomed. That being said, a good team by your side makes a difference when getting through your workday. It makes me feel less stressed at the end of my workdays.

Any advice for citizens/community members looking for a stable position?

When applying, ensure your commitment to the job you are applying for. Living on the Nation has its challenges, particularly due to the lack of public transportation, which can be difficult for those without reliable transportation. Never give up, as I have experienced rejection multiple times. I always reflect after and ask myself what I need to do to improve and how I can meet the requirements of the positions I apply for. I also reflect on my behaviours and consider what changes I need to make to increase my chances of success. Often, rejection is due to the lack of qualifications, so I focus on acquiring the necessary skills. Investing my time in personal development is crucial to achieving my goals. As an adult, I am responsible for my own success. Remember to keep on trying and continue to do your best.

Anything else you would like to mention?

I would like to mention that I often think about the difficulties that our Nation is currently facing, including loss and economic hardship, amongst other challenges. My heart goes out to everyone, and I offer my genuine prayers for you and your families, remembering the teachings of my late grandparents and my mother, who is still with us today. I am concerned about her health and acknowledge that life is short, which is why I try to spend as much quality time with her as possible, reminding you all that life is precious, and we should treat each other with respect, kindness, and compassion while teaching the values our elders taught us to our children. It's important that we address the issue of bullying; it's imperative, and it starts with us. I remember the words of our elders growing up, to treat each other with kindness and respect. I'm not a preacher or better than anyone else; I just want our Nation to reconnect.

Disney Loreans

The Ultimate Disney Fan Trading Card Game

On August 18th, 2023, Disney released their first trading card game called Lorcana in local card shops in the United States, with a wide release on September 1st, 2023. The first set they released for the card game series is titled Disney Lorcana: The First Chapter. This drop put both Disney fans and card game enthusiasts into a frenzy, attempting to get their hands on the three initial Starter Decks and some Booster Packs to begin collecting and learn how to play this new game.

Lorcana cards feature characters, items, props, and locations from various Disney movies and IPs (Intellectual Property). The art found on the cards is all new artworks not seen anywhere else, and the characters usually have new, never-before-seen outfits or backgrounds. Additionally, some cards are rarer or special due to many factors, including limited prints, foil prints, etching, full-art, alternate artworks, promotional distributions, and "Enchanted" cards, meaning they feature a raised symbol on the card. The highly collectable and desirable



cards are ones that feature multiple of these rarities, for example, a full art, foil, Enchanted card is more collectible than a simple foil print, but a regular foil card is more desirable than a normal card.

Currently, the most collectible and rare cards are the ones from the first series, The First Chapter, as they are no longer being printed, and the sets are very expensive and difficult to find. Booster Packs are also considerably more collectible than the Starter Decks, because Starter Packs include a pre-determined set of cards. Whereas with Booster Packs, you have the possibility of pulling these rare, foil, full-art, and

enchanted cards. Lorcana's game-play functions comparably to the popular trading card game Magic: The Gathering, with some changes to make the game more family-friendly.

Similar to Magic: The Gathering, there are pre-made decks, and each pre-made deck, Lorcana decks, include 60 cards and one Booster Pack. The decks feature two of the six available "ink" colours. "Inks" are magical resources that are used to play cards, as each card has an "ink" cost to play it and to activate a card's abilities. These "inks" have the same functionalities that "lands" do in Magic: The Gathering. They are represented by six different colours: Amber (Yellow), Amethyst (Purple), Emerald (Green), Ruby (Red), Sapphire (Blue), and Steel (Grey). Each card has a cost value, a strength value, a willpower value, and a lore value, while some cards also have an inkwell icon, meaning that the card may be used as either an "ink" or a player. The goal of Disney Lorcana is to reach 20 Lore points before your opponent does. This is done by exerting (playing) character cards to use their abilities against your opponent and gain Lore points. By using abilities and weakening your opponents' cards, you are slowing down their progress while increasing your Lore points.



Overall, I enjoy playing Lorcana; it's a straightforward card game with elements of strategy and fun Disney references. Once the game is all set up and ready to play, it's easy to understand what each card does as the cards explain themselves. I have a lot of fun thinking about game strategy based on what cards you have in your hand and seeing how two characters from two very different

movies could possibly interact. My favourite part about Disney Lorcana is the collecting aspect of the trading card game. I enjoy hunting for the rare cards and picking my favourites based on their looks and what movies they are fun. Right now, I am in the midst of collecting as many Disney Hercules cards as I can. I might make a deck with them to play, but mostly I want to create a whole card binder full of all of the Hercules cards to look at them. If you, your family, or someone you know is a fan of Disney and likes to play games of any kind, I would recommend trying out Disney Lorcana. It's a competitive, strategy-based game with cuteness all rolled up into one.



Gas Stop Goodies

I used to work at the Tsúūt'ínà Gas Stop for just shy of 6 years, and because of that, I have seen a lot of different types of products go in and out of those doors. One product I was never able to fully test out was the G5 handheld game box. Until now.




This game box is a cool little piece of nostalgia and technology all wrapped up into a cool little handheld unit. It has an RCA cables that let you connect to larger screens (RCA cables are those ones from VCRs and DVD players that we used to use all the time, that are Red, Yellow, and White) (VCRs and DVDs are what we used to use before streaming platforms, ask your parents if you were born pre-Y2K).

With old school games like "Galactica", "Super Mario Bros" and "Lunar Ball", it's sure to scratch that nostalgia itch. It even has new pixelated versions of mobile games like "Angry Birds", so there is guaranteed to be a game for everyone somewhere in this little unit.

Overall, it's a cool retro game emulator that houses an impressive 500 (ish) games and comes with TV adapters and a rechargeable battery. It makes a great companion for boring office visits, long drives, or your next lazy Sunday. It's only \$25 (w/o tax) and can usually be found consistently on the shelves at the Buffalo Run location.


Kentmere 200: Ilford's New Black & White Film

Up until recently, the idea of new film stocks was a rarity. Even now, it takes years and years of research and development for a new release. However, film photographers like me have been spoiled in 2025 with new options and the promise of more. Phoenix 200 II, Harman RED, and Kentmere 200. I've only shot the latter, so that's what I'll talk about with some examples.

Out of the gate, the new offering came in 35mm, 120, and even bulk rolls for the dedicated. We love options. For me, and I'm sure many others, the biggest advantage is the price point. In Calgary, Kentmere 200 can be found in 24 and 36-exposure 35mm rolls for \$9.99 (plus tax). This is huge. Shooting film is an






I shot my first three rolls in May – July of 2025, mostly under immensely bright sun. Hostile conditions when you're looking for punchy contrast.


As you can see, it can run away from you quickly when metered incorrectly. When metered correctly, this new stock does deliver the steep contrast it promised, even under immense sunlight. Here are a few examples of the performance. The photos provided are a mixture of 35mm and 120 formats.







I've only shot the three rolls so far, not enough time for a full review, but I would give this a solid 8/10. Incredibly versatile, I would be comfortable using this in most scenarios with medium lighting or more. I leave you with a final photo, a favourite of mine.





Tsúūt'ínà Nations very own Destiny Whitney was featured in the Humans of Canadian Golf content series from golfcanada.ca.


