

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
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# Story to THE NATION

Story by the Communications Team based off the teachings of Tsuut'ina Elders



In the past when our people were nomadic, coming across the right berry bush was not always easy, as not all berries are fit for consumption. If we came upon berries we did not trust, we would wait to watch the bears to see if they would eat them. If the bear ate the berries we could be certain it was safe for us too. The only berries we could not eat, even though the bear did, was the bear berry.

As each berry matured we would pick them and prepare them as a single meal or dry them to preserve. Berries were preserved by drying them in the sun. In the later months, when food sources were lower, we would soak them in water to regain their moisture.

Today, saskatoon berries are still enjoyed whether on their own or turned into jam, spreads, pies or other various baked goods. The perfect time to pick saskatoons is

in the Summer, as early as June to the end of August.

Saskatoon berries are also a vital ingredient to traditional ceremonies. Often turned into soup, the soup is shared amongst participants. Before they could all eat, one berry from each person is given to a collector/helper as an offering.

The month of Jija dinit'asi ch'at'agha *August* is Berry Picking Month, with wild bushes still growing on Tsuut'ina Nation, make sure to respect and enjoy some of these very delicious fruits. Siyisgaas.



# ECHOES OF YESTERDAY

## RODEO CATEGORIES



### BREAKAWAY ROPING

is a variation of calf roping where a calf is roped, but not thrown and tied.




### TIE DOWN ROPING

The goal of this timed event is for the rider to catch the calf by throwing a loop of rope from a lariat around its neck, dismount from the horse, run to the calf, and restrain it by tying its three legs together.

### BARREL RACING

Against a 60 second time limit, the competitor races in a clover pattern around preset barrels.




### MUTTON BUSTING

This event is for very young children where they ride sheep similar to bronc riding.




### STEER RIDING

Similar to saddle bronc, the rider attempts to stay on a cow or young bull for eight seconds without falling off.



### SADDLE BRONC RIDING

Known as rodeo's classic event, the competitor must stay on the horse for 8 seconds, their score is based on performance as well as the horse's performance.



### STEER WRESTLING

Also known as bulldogging, starting on horseback, the rider has to drop onto a steer from their horse and wrestle the steer to lay down in the shortest amount of time.


### BULL RIDING

The rider has to stay on the bull for 8 seconds, but they also have to keep one hand free and be technically sound to be scored.



### TEAM ROPING

With two ropers, a 'Header' and a 'Heeler,' the Header first catches the steer, usually around the horns and the Heeler then has to catch the hind legs of the steer. Fastest time wins.



### BAREBACK RIDING

Though this event seems similar to Saddle Bronc, it is a different style and is considered the most strenuous event on the rider.

## TRUDEAU TO APOLOGIZE TO RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL SURVIVORS

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau will apologize to residential school survivors in Newfoundland and Labrador. The Prime Minister's Office confirmed Thursday that Trudeau will apologize in Labrador. A spokesman for the prime minister, said. "We're committed to reconciliation. We're committed to implementing the calls to action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission ... that's why we made this decision." Former Prime Minister Stephen Harper excluded the province's former residential schools from a national apology and compensation package

in 2008. "The apology in 2008 made it seem like we didn't exist and that we didn't suffer in the same way that our fellow survivors across the nation suffered. We suffered as much as anyone and an apology, to me and other survivors will go a long way towards our healing. Maybe I can finally put that tortured inner child to rest," survivor Toby Obed said in a statement. An exact date and location have not been confirmed but an update is expected later this Summer.

## TEEN INDIAN RELAY RACE RIDER TOPPING RODEO CIRCUIT STANDINGS

Thirteen year old Tyrell Mcgilvery, took 1st place at recent competitions, after being introduced to the sport earlier this summer. While new to the sport of relay race, Mcgilvery grew up riding horses at Goodfish Lake First Nation in Northern Alberta. As many know, Indian Horse Relay is a traditional race but has only been garnering widespread attention after a revival of the sport began a few years ago. Jockeys ride bareback, with no helmets, around a racetrack. Riders run three laps around the track while switching horses after each lap. The first one to the finish takes

the prize money — and Mcgilvery did just that at Piikani First Nation's Indian Days. His team, called *Treaty Six*, also took first place at the World Indigenous Nations Games championship in Maskwacis, Alta., in July. Team Treaty Six will be racing in Saddle Lake and Cold Lake on the weekend of Aug. 18-20 and is planning to enter the world finals event in Billings, Montana, in September. The event was also featured at the 2017 Calgary Stampede. Hopefully the trend continues and we can see our traditional sports in the mainstream.

## RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL SURVIVOR USES HORSES TO HEAL FROM TRAUMA

Patrick Buffalo has always felt a connection to horses. But by spending time with them and discovering the healing potential of the horse "Spirit," Buffalo says it has helped him heal from his own trauma stemming from his time in residential school. "To me, it's very therapeutic to work with horses," said Buffalo, who owns over a dozen horses at his ranch property on the Maskwacis reserve in Alberta. "We have two brains: the one in your head and one in your heart. We as Nehiyawak [Plains Cree] think from the heart. The Mooniyaw [white man] speaks from the brain because of the education system, and we were taught that way in residential school. But everyone is capable of thinking from the heart. The idea is to move that person [through horse therapy] from the head

back to the heart." Buffalo, 60, attended residential school in the 1960s in the nearby community of Ermineskin, Alta. He said it was a sad and lonely time there as a child, but he had to learn to adapt to it. However, after reconnecting with his traditional beliefs, including accessing the healing potential of horses, Buffalo said it helped him get over the scarring experience. He said a lot of Indigenous people are stuck in a rut, in a state of victim-hood, when it comes to healing. They use the "white" system to access psychiatrists and other mainstream avenues of therapy, but it's not working too well, he said. Buffalo said it's time to get back to practicing culture, which includes re-establishing a relationship with horses.

# RUSSELL BIG CROW



*Born to Hilda & George Big Crow on July 12, 1928; we honour Russell Big Crow as he recently celebrated his 89th birthday. Russell welcomed the communications team to his home and had many joyous stories to share but also described the feelings of loneliness as many of his peers have passed on. "All those people I know, they're gone. They left me behind."*

*We are blessed and honored for the sharing of honesty, Russell's openness reminds of why it's so important to engage and learn from our Elders.*

*Additionally, elders, like our ancestors or those who know the way of ceremonies, usually use body language more than words to explain. Russell was very animated when he spoke, the way of the pipe- which is what his mother taught him.*

**Did you have Elders guide you when you were young?**

"Yeah. In the 1930's most of the elders passed on, they died of tuberculosis. There were no houses, just broken down luck houses. The floors were dirt. Poor Sarcees. Three of my brothers all at once died."

We are told how Russell grew up with five brothers and four sisters but is now the oldest surviving sibling. Growing up, he was given the name 'Middle House' by his mother when she taught him about pipe ceremonies. Russell also talked about his father and his biological father stating, "It's nobody's fault, my mother didn't know she was pregnant with me. That's when I

**What is your Indian Name?**

"My grand-father named me, [speaks name in Tsuut'ina], it translates to 'Poor Boy.' He's right" he says jokingly.

**Where were you born?**

"In a barn" he laughs.

**Thank you for having us, did you enjoy your birthday this year, did you have a party?**

"No party this year, [due to the busy time of Stampede] I'm happy, thankful I survived."

*we are reminded at this point that Russell is hard of hearing and it presented some difficulties with conversation, some answered are paraphrased.*

thought I'll name myself, Russell Scarecrow," he laughs.

**Did you play any sports growing up?**

He didn't play any sports growing up, but he did have a liking to horses and training them. Growing up as a ranch hand, those who can relate, raising and taking care of livestock is enough in life.

**“I had a great life with my horse.”**

"I like telling stories about myself. I used to train horses, I had 28."

He commemorates this year's Annual Celebrations saying it was a success. "You know, you wouldn't believe me, no one believes me but I helped with the arbor," he says. He explains how there's only a few

of them left who are alive who also helped with the construction of the Tsuut'ina Powwow Arbor.

**Did you ever have the chance to get married? Do you have any stories about your wife?**

This is when we truly appreciate Russell's openness with his life as losing a spouse is a difficult topic. "My wife passed away from cancer," he says. He lovingly talked about how they got married on Christmas Day and had nine children together.

In regards to health, Russell openly talks about how he has suffered a stroke and has undergone hip replacement surgery, "that was painful." Despite this, Russell still lives his everyday with a positive attitude and sharing his outlook on life.

Russell finished the interview with saying, "It's good that you're asking me questions like this." He would like to say thank you to his family and also sends his gratitude to his caregivers for taking care of him in his everyday life. "They're trying to help me."

Siyisgaastzi-tii to you Russell, for taking the time to sit and talk with us about your life and sharing your stories. It's difficult for elders but we hope it encourages others to share their stories or encourage others to listen to these stories.

## TSUUT'INA TRAIL NAMED

Lee Crowchild, Amarjeet Sohi, Brian Mason, Kent Hehr, and Naheed Nenshi officially commemorated the start of construction on the southwest portion of the Calgary Ring Road with the new segmented named "Tsuut'ina Trail". "This is more than the naming of a road. This will reflect in perpetuity how the past and futures are intertwined. Given the critical role that Tsuut'ina played in the completion of this project, we look forward to the day when the entire ring road is named Tsuut'ina." Spoke Chief Lee Crowchild.

This work represents the start of one of two remaining sections of the Ring Road. The road is expected to be open in 2021 to an expected 80,000-100,000 vehicles per day. "Calgarians are proud of our long history that includes thousands of years of indigenous culture on this land. I can't think of a better name for this important peice of infrastructure than Tsuut'ina Trail. It is a reminder of our common path as neighbors and fellow citizens" -Calgary Mayor, Naheed Nenshi.

# CHEQUE PRESENTATIONS

Tsuut'ina Nation, in an effort for transparency, has been working with the Nations Proposal and Grant writer, Renee Price to continue to bring financial assets to the Nation. This month, two cheque presentations were made from Enmax and Canderel.

Canderel proudly presented Ivonne Crane and members of Chief and Council, with a \$25,000 cheque for the Men's Shelter. Additionally, Canderel announced the foundation of the Canderel opportunities fund to support post

secondary students and small business initiatives.

Councilors Regina Crowchild and Leon Littlelight proudly accepted \$8,000 from Enmax. This contribution is designated towards Annual Celebrations, the Museum, and the Food Bank.

These initiatives are a result of the Nation working with a Grant and Proposal writer to explore partnership opportunities, corporate, municipal, provincial and federal donors, as well as donations and grants.



# NATIONAL GATHERING OF ELDERS



The National Gathering of Elders will be hosted in Edmonton at the Edmonton Expo Center from September 11-14, 2017. For the first time, First Nations, Métis and Inuit elders representing more than 600 organizations across Canada have been invited to get together to share ideas and learn from one another. The purpose for an Elders Gathering is so the Elders can come together and take their rightful place as advisors, teachers and leaders. The primary role of the Elders Advisory Committee comprised of representatives from different Indigenous groups of Alberta is to guide and provide leadership to 10 coordinators (helpers) of the National Gathering of Elders. It is estimated as many as 4,000 elders could be at the gathering. Some of the topics during the week will include discussion on Climate Change, Reconciliation, Treaties & Education.

## Tsuut'ina Legislative Property Taxation Law Info Sheet



### WHAT IS THE EXISTING TAXATION BY- LAW

- In 1977 the first Taxation By-law was passed by Chief and Council:
  - The by-law was passed with the intent to collect money from transmission facilities (e.g. power lines, pipelines, and telecommunications systems) build and operated on the Nation's territory.
  - Prior to 1977, this money was leaving the Nation and going to the neighboring municipalities (City of Calgary, Rocky View and Foothills.)

### WHERE ARE WE NOW WITH TAXATION?

- Now that the Tsuut'ina Nation is part of FNTC (First Nation Tax Commission) and FMA (First Nation Fiscal Management Act), we are able to:
  - Continue with enforcing the existing Section 83 Tax Bylaws.
  - Ultimately – collect taxes from non-member business located on Tsuut'ina land (i.e. shops, gas stations, ring road development.)

### WHAT IS PROPERTY TAXATION?

- Governments impose property taxes to generate money for public purposes.
- Payments of property tax goes towards the services that are provided by the Nation. (Such as emergency services, infrastructure, roads, etc.)
- Taxation will allow the Nation to collect money from individuals and companies located on the Reserve to offset the cost of operating the Nation.
- Property taxation is a tax charged to the owner or user of land and buildings and is charged annually.
- Tax based on assessed value of land and improvements. (Buildings, towers, pipelines, etc.)
- Long term revenue stream provides the following:
  - Used to finance commercial and residential infrastructure.
  - Provides on-going operations and maintenance of infrastructure investment.
  - Provides services to ratepayers.

### WHERE WILL THE FUNDING GO?

- Tax dollars will be used to provide tax services and to help offset costs of operating the Nation.

### Examples:

- Money will be required to set-up and cover the costs of operating Taxation Office.
- Services with Development Lands, such as Garbage and Snow Removal.

The Nation has the authority to decide how to allocate this money to these costs when determining the budget.

### WHO IS EXEMPT FROM PROPERTY TAXATION?

Tsuut'ina Nation Citizens will not be taxed under taxation law.

- The FMA and its Guidelines give Tsuut'ina the ability to create tax exemptions.
- Any tax exemption must be set out in any law enacted by Tsuut'ina.
- Tsuut'ina has given an exemption to Citizens from paying any form of property tax.
  - Note: Nation Corporations are also exempt from paying property tax.
  - "Nation Corporations" are defined as a corporation where the majority of the shares are held in trust for the benefit of the Nation or all the Citizens of the Nation.
- The Tsuut'ina Law deals specifically with real property only (Land.)
- The Tsuut'ina Law does not deal with personal property (Nation Citizens.)
- Since exemption has been given to Citizens, they will not pay any taxes under the Tsuut'ina Law.

- So personal property of Citizens, such as personal income or business income, would not be taxed under the Tsuut'ina Law, as it does not deal with personal property.

- Property that is held or occupied by Tsuut'ina is also exempt from taxation.

#### WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN INDIAN ACT AND FMA PROPERTY TAX?

##### First Nations Fiscal Management Act (FMA)

- FMA is a comprehensive authority for First Nation Taxation.
- First Nation led enabling legislation used by over 100 First Nations. Contains all tax powers available under section 83, plus additional revenue jurisdiction.
- Council enacts laws under the FMA and does not need Minister Approval.
- Laws are reviewed and approved by First Nations Tax Commission.
- Laws are easier to use and understand.

- Laws provide better enforcement mechanisms.

#### Indian Act – Section 83

- Property Tax Power first emerged in 1884.
- Used by 60 First Nations across Canada.
- Council can enact a tax bylaw under Section 83.
  - By-laws are reviewed and approved by First Nation tax Commission (formerly the Indian taxation Advisory Board)

- By-Law are approved by the Minister

I finished setting up the hunting platform in the barracks and all I need to know is..... Who's interested to learn I'm also open to teaching our youth.







July 17-28 Tsuut'ina Nation held a Literacy Camp as organized through Frontier College. The Alberta government has committed \$1.6 million over three years to keep the camps going. The camp program started in northern Ontario in 2005 to help students keep up their learning between school years. It has since expanded to more than 140 communities across Canada.

**Communications' own Dalton sat down with us about his journey so far with music, phowtography, and film making. A SAIT graduate, he plans to pursue film making and become an editor**



**Who are you and what do you do?**

My name is Dalton Dodginghorse and I'm a photographer, film editor, and a musician. I've played drums for bands such as Troublemaker with Tyler Meguinis, Distro Panic with Colton Crowchild and Ethan Meguinis, and have played in bands off the Nation such as Clueless, Midnight Development, The Martin Project, Billy Walker band, and currently Orbit The Fox. I like to release solo music in my spare time on my YouTube account along with some of my video edits. As well as taking photos for the magazine I like to work with 35mm film photography and I usually get a lot of them printed at London drugs. Currently I'm taking a few freelance jobs editing with my company Wild Lines so in the future I would like to expand or at least get a full time job editing movies.

**How do you prefer to work, do you have a devoted studio space?**

I do all my editing and mixing on my laptop. When it comes to recording I usually just rig something up in my bedroom, or when it's with bands I have a small studio where my drums are that I like to record in.

**What is integral to your work as an artist?**

If I'm writing scripts, editing a project, brainstorming ideas, or doing photo editing my favorite place to be is out in like a cafe or something. That way



I could judge people and ask myself **"would the people sitting beside me enjoy whatever I'm working on?"** and it's hard to do that when you're the only person working on it.

**What work do you most enjoying doing?**

That's a hard one because I enjoy them all a lot, even though I'm editing something or when I'm drumming I almost get like a high where I just feel more in the zone than anything else, especially if the musicians are really good and you could get a jam going or the footage you get is actually something you could work with.

**What memorable responses have you had to your work?**

It's a really good feeling after you've performed a song and you could see that the people in the crowd are enjoying it. When you've worked away at practicing a song and writing stuff it's a relief to finally get it out there.

**Do you encourage others to live the artistic life?**

It's a lot of stress so as long as you could find a way to keep mentally healthy then by all means go for it. The crazy artist who never gets any sleep and doesn't eat is romanticized way too much now a days so if you could maintain yourself under deadlines and know how to filter voices around you then go for it. And if you don't know how to do that then just do it anyways because it's a lot of fun and you'll eventually learn how to do things like silencing your inner critique or

being able to pick out constructive comments from the trolls.

**What do you dislike about the art world?**

That people who play it too safe or just make things to take advantage of people's pockets. With how easy it is to make things now a days the market can get super over saturated so it's important to find a unique voice rather than trying to make things that are just going to appeal to a wide audience that are less personal or less risky.

New York, or LA, or Toronto, or London, ...or Bullhead Hall!


